The plunge and risk I took when I sat my little family down and asked my husband and our daughter if they supported my dream, was intimidating. Support me they did! I have never looked back.

Nurse Anesthetist | Independent Practice Addiction Advocate | Obstetric Anesthesia Arts Patron | Political Activist Granddaughter to a Suffragette | Daughter to a banker Wife to my advocate | Mom to a fierce lady

Is this backwards? Of course, I am a mother and a wife first. It is the journey I have been on with my family that allows me to be all the things I am. My family and the women I choose as family have been my strength and my foundation. I have been allowed to grow into the woman I am, and hopefully, the mother I am through the strength with which I have been instilled and the support I have received. I don't ever forget that.

While getting my BA in Political Science from the University of Minnesota in 1990, I set off with a backpack and some bleach tablets to Central America. While working on the 500 years of Resistance Conference of Indigenous Peoples in Guatemala, I met a Nurse Anesthetist in the hills working with a surgical group doing cleft palate repairs in a tent in a remote town I happened to be visiting. She inspired the beginning of my journey into Anesthesia. At the ripe age of 21, I couldn't imagine anyone cooler than her. I came home, finished my degree in Poli Sci. Ten years, two degrees, one failed marriage, one child, lost parents, change of state and trudging through a myriad of personal demons later, I graduated from the graduate anesthesia program at the University of Akron becoming a CRNA.

Funny thing about nursing, you often think of a woman. If you go to anesthesia school, the numbers become more evenly placed between men and women. If you start your own business in anesthesia and work for vourself, there are more men than woman. I worked in a couple of great groups in larger hospitals with women I will be friends with for the rest of my life. It is a safe and sure thing, but I will never forget the woman I met in Guatemala. The plunge and risk I took when I sat my little family down and asked my husband and our daughter if they supported my dream, was intimidating. Support me they did! I have never looked back. Sure, I had some long hours and I traveled all over the state making connections with groups to establish a working schedule, but I was in control of that schedule. Despite working a lot. I was afforded the opportunity to shape my hours so that I could be at every performance, every musical, every play, and most... but not all holidays.

Now that I am older and my daughter is carving out her own path, I am able to give back to the communities in which I work and live. I am in love with obstetric anesthesia and work overnight shifts in Richland County. The addiction rate there is at least double the national average and mothers are no exception. I run a group called Moms Getting Sober and am working to bring that group to Canton. I am getting my doctorate now focusing on the Opioid Crisis so that I may continue to work towards strategies to help addicted mothers find help and stay sober. I have been lucky to know women, (and men) who have inspired me in my life to be the best version of me. I hope in this next phase of life I can pay it forward.

I want to thank Diane Pete for the inspiration she has always been to me and for all the contributions she has given her community. I am immeasurably lucky to know such women. They are, and will always be, the reason we all succeed.

I think it is important for each of us to do our part in the community and inspire others to do so as well. I went from a successful career with Ohio State Parks to stay-at-home-mom. By design, but it took some getting used to. I knew no one when I moved to Canton except my husband, his family, and our newborn baby. After our son was a few years old I explored the Canton Arts District, volunteered at the First Ladies National Historic Site, and loved dining at local restaurants.

In 2010 I took a girls trip to Scottsdale, Arizona. My cousin got us tickets to something called a "food tour". I thought we could have found a better way to spend the afternoon, but went along for the ride. We explored the city, ate great food, threw down some cocktails, laughed, and learned about local history. I immediately fell for the concept and thought about creating something like it in Canton. My excitement came to a halt when I got off the airplane at Canton-Akron Airport and reality hit.

"Who the heck" I thought, " would be willing to pay \$50 to do a walking tour in Canton, Ohio?!?"

But I knew what we had - great history, restaurants, a walkable city with artful color and flair... and great stories to tell.

I took a \$10 business class from Kent State Stark. I flew back to Arizona to talk with the tour operator there. I studied Canton history from top to bottom. I worked on routes and talking points for one full year. I developed partnerships with restaurants. I endured a lot of people telling me to my face, "Wow! That sounds interesting..." but could sense the eye roll when I walked away.

April of 2012 I launched the first tour and haven't looked back since. I was named Entrepreneur of the Year in 2013 by the Canton Regional Chamber of Commerce, earned the Repository's People's Choice Award for Best Downtown Business in 2015, and became a member of the Cleveland Chapter of Les Dames D'Escoffier in 2015. I recently co-authored the book, "Stark County FOOD: From Early Farms to Modern Meals".

Meet Angela Fach of Canton Girl Gang

Every day was a challenge. I slept on an air mattress for over a year because I wanted to make sure the kids had what they needed first.

Sometimes people can find themselves in precarious or depressing points in their lives, as if they are standing at a fork in the road. One of the paths would lead them down the path of continuing to be a victim and the other path would lead them down a new path to a self-empowered life. For the lucky ones, a moment of illumination and clarity can come through to their consciousness at times like these. During times of trial and tribulation amazing changes can occur, changes that leave not only the individual in a better place but can ripple out into the world. Such enlightenment often leads to the immense and undeniable desire to share what they have learned with others and to give back what they have been given. Here is my story.

In 2011 I was married, had a nice home and two beautiful children. From the outside, everything appeared perfect. From the inside, it was anything but. I found myself in a life that did not belong to me. It did not take long for my marriage to fall apart. I suffered an extremely painful divorce where my ex-husband and ex-mother in law attacked me in a setup plan to try to take my two little boys from me. My children were five months and two years old at the time. I was stripped from everything I ever had - my home, my clothes, my belongings, money, my work, but most importantly my

two small children.

I spent five days in jail for a crime I did not commit , while he kept my children from me in a plan to get rid of me. I had no money, no resources, nowhere to live and had three separate charges I needed to fight in order to save my life and unite with my children.

I felt desperate and alone and almost defeated with every odd against me. I started reading and doing a lot of self-reflection in this dark time. Desperate for help, I started applying some of the principles I read to my life and how I handled endless days in court, my ex, and my current mental situation. I knew I had to uncover the truth and find a way to get through the days. Each day was unbearable and Lactually had an early moment where I was planning to commit suicide. That is when things really shifted. I remember looking into my children's eyes and it was like a fire was lit. I knew that I couldn't fight this problem with the same hate and malicious behavior that started it if I wanted to see the results I wanted. I staved the course everyday, and made conscious choices to shine light onto the situation. I had to take a good look in the mirror and decide what I was made of. Although, my ex took all of the material things from me, the things he couldn't take from me were my love for my children, my passion, my drive, my talent and my determination.

Little by little, friends donated items to me for my children. Every little bit helped. One friend in particular from high school was my saving grace and helped my children and I get into place. He covered the rent/ deposit for the first couple months so I could get back on my feet. I will forever be grateful for the friends who stepped up to help me in such a dark and difficult time. I was eventually able to get a low end camera and started taking sessions again. Every day was a challenge. I slept on an air mattress for over a year because I wanted to make sure the kids had what they needed first. It took two and a half years of court appearances and the battle put me into debt over fifty thousand dollars. Birthdays and holidays went by and I struggled to make them special for my children due to the lack of financial means and the attorneys' bills.





At my final hearing, I did not fight for any money or household items. I only asked to be with my children. I was awarded custody and the schedule I wanted with my children.

Through this experience and my own personal growth, I was inspired to create an apparel line called Universal Architect. Each day, I decided that I would be the architect of my own life and create the life I wanted. I didn't want to give anyone power over my life again. I did this by tuning into the present, intentionally choosing thoughts of love and light, living in a high vibrational state of mind and executing steps required to bring my desires into manifestation. This sense of purpose and longing to help others going through difficult times in their own lives sparked the apparel line. I work from a place of inspired action, and the energy I put into my creations comes straight from my heart.

Around this time, I also co-founded a nonprofit, You Can You Will Foundation. This non-profit organization is dedicated to improving the lives of individuals who aspire to realize their full potential by providing the knowledge that opens doors to infinite possibilities. We create and support programs focused on the mind, body and soul that educate and inspire individuals to discover the answers within themselves. We do this by placing a strong emphasis on self-empowerment, wellness and a sense of community.

One of my passions of being a mother is to empower children, so we launched ISP (Inspiring School

It has been almost 8 years now since and I have expanded my photography business plus launched Angela Fach Photography at www.angelafach.com, where I focus more on branding/lifestyle and corporate photography. I also offer logo design and graphic design services.

In 2018, I started the Canton Girl Gang. I empathized with other women, mothers and business owners and knew what a challenge it was to move forward without any support. CGG is a female-led initiative that is raising the vibration of Canton, empowering women and business owners. We are creating a community of local entrepreneurs, mamas, movers and shakers who are supportive of one another, uplifting in their words and purposeful in their actions. Canton Girl Gang is not only a supportive group for these women but have also become the family I never had.

Through this amazing experience of awareness and enlightenment, I discovered my true self and purpose. It's my goal to help others do the same.

I was lucky enough to grow up under a matriarch. She was tough, she knew her power. She stood in it and never wavered. She also made great sacrifices, difficult changes, and raised children, including me, that weren't "hers", way past her prime. My grandmother, my sweet Dee, taught me that kindness is also power, that the ability to sacrifice for a loved one is a kind of strength that is unrivaled.

That is why, when Dee got sick and I was 26 years old, I knew exactly what I was going to do. I was going to show up for someone who had always shown up for me. I moved home. I learned way more about cancer than I ever wanted to know. I learned way more about medical insurance, and life insurance, than I ever wanted to know. I traded my 'freedom', many Saturday nights out, for quiet cups of teachy a hospital bed in my living room.

I had my ups and downs, my failed relationships, my changed-majors-one-too-many-times debt. I quit college, moved across the country for a boy, just to come back broken-hearted. I found what I thought was my calling and finished college with a BA in Applied conflict management (with a minor in Women's studies, of course). I got what I thought was my dream job, and it broke my heart. The system I was fighting, but also at the mercy of, made me want to scream. So I quit. I had felt like a failure so many times. But there was always at least one person, who could bring me to a sobering realization that I was, by no means, out of chances. And for that, I'll be eternally grateful.

I got my real estate license while taking care of Dee in her last year on earth. My head seemed to always be in a fog, maybe from all the fear pent up in there. But I had learned from her example to be calm, resilient, and fearless in those moments where the world seems to be crumbling around you. I was that for her, because of her. I closed my very first real estate transaction on the day she took her last breath. I held her hand as her soul rose out of her body. Sometimes I swear I saw her, and heard her say goodbye and thank you as she rose through the ceiling. And maybe I did. But one thing is for sure, she isn't gone. She lives on in the strength I have in every difficult negotiation, in the compassion I have for every client, and in the fearlessness I have co-running a girl gang.

I truly believe that women have the power to change the world for the betterment of humanity. I believe that our long history of cultural oppression has transformed us into spiritual Olympians who can and will carry the weight of the world on our shoulders. We have bonded, and those bonds are not easily broken. When we let go of the petty competition over men and attention, when we say 'no' to the games society wants us to play, and to the labels, we become unstoppable.

That's my dream for the gang; to help all the women

around us shed all of the things that they are not, to get back to our compassionate, fearless and unwaveringly strong roots. Together we are stronger, and together we are better.

Meet Annette Swindin of The Green Vegetarian and Vegan A Go Go

After two weeks in the hospital, and on the mend, I decided to start my plant-based life. I became VEGAN

I guess you could say, my story started December 22, 1995, that's the day my husband Nick, died from Transitional Cell Carcinoma.

It started in his kidneys and within 6 months cancer took over his whole body. The last 2 months of his life, he was completely paralyzed from the armpits down. As he lay dying, he said to me "Annette, I'm the luckiest person in the world, I got to do what I wanted with my life (he was a gifted puppeteer and artist) and marry the girl of my dreams".

After the initial shock of becoming a widow at 37 and raising my 8-year-old daughter, Kyra, alone, I decided to move back to my roots, Cincinnati, to be with my family. We were living outside of Philadelphia at the time of his death.

Fast forward to June 2005, 10 years later. I found myself living in Canton. Kyra had just graduated from Perry High School and getting ready to attend Akron University to pursue a teaching degree, when I realized I was having trouble catching my breath.

Of course, I ignored my symptoms and went about in my everyday life, until I realized, I really should see what was going on. I took myself off to Stat Care where they did a chest x-ray. The doctor looked like he was in shock, he told me I had to go immediately to the emergency room. So, off I went to Aultman, where they took an MRI, they told me I had a huge mass in my lungs. My thoughts raced, "I can't die, my daughter would be left without any parent, I need to get through this, no matter what".

After many tests and biopsies, it was determined I had Hodgkins. My tumor which was the size of a grapefruit turned out to not be in my lungs but wrapped around the main arteries of my heart. I was determined to fight this "thing". I never once gave up hope, I couldn't leave my daughter!

I was on a very strenuous form of chemotherapy, I was asked to do a study,. Instead of almost a year of chemo, I could do it in 12 weeks, I began a 12-week journey with chemotherapy, followed by 4 weeks of radiation. I went to chemo every Thursday, and it wiped me out. Every Wednesday, when I was just about to feel better, BAM, I had to do it all over again the next day.

After the chemo and radiation, I thought, "Okay, I'm all better now, let's get back to life". But unfortunately, all that takes a toll on you. I wasn't feeling "normal" again for almost 2 years.

At that time, I decided, "Time to get healthy again". I started walking, and at the end of my walks, I noticed a heaviness in my chest. At my next oncology check-up, I told my doctor about the heaviness in my chest. Off I went for a stress test, which I failed.

Heart catheterization followed, and they determined I needed stents because the radiation had damaged my arteries.

Six months later, I had another follow-up stress test, and failed again. They ordered another heart cath. This time, I was so scared they couldn't get the stents in at Aultman, so they sent me to Cleveland Clinic.

The doctor there, highly suggested I become vegetarian. I looked at him puzzled. I thought I ate healthily!





Of course, I tried. It was hard after being a carnivore for over 45 years to give up meat!

Several months later, I woke up with a choking feeling. I felt like I was being choked. Again, I ignored it, until I realized, I needed to go to the emergency room.

They ordered another Heart Cath, and this time, no stent - I needed a triple by-pass.

So, April 2009, as I was waiting for open-heart surgery, I was given a book by my surgeon "Prevent and Reverse Heart Disease" by Caldwell B Esselstyn. This book changed my life. The book is about eating a plant-based diet and why. You see, I was told, I only had one chance at repairing my arteries, I was too scared to be opened up again.

After two weeks in the hospital, and on the mend, I decided to start my plant-based life. I became VEGAN.

I got involved with the Cardiac Rehab department at Aultman, with the suggestion of nurse, Adene Keller. She encouraged me to do cooking demo's on becoming vegan. Adene has a Plant-Based Support Group that meets monthly at Aultman North.

From that, came cooking classes, catering, cooking for clients.

I remember reflecting on my life up until then: my daughter was happily married and an amazing teacher; and I was about to turn 60 - I figured this was my last chapter. I better start thinking and realizing my dreams and goals.

I always wanted to open a Vegan restaurant. I was asked by many people where my restaurant was and I had a catchy name in mind, "Vegan A Go-Go". I just kept thinking, I don't want a 24/7 responsibility.

Wouldn't you know, not even a week later, a friend of mine called and told me about this "kid" up in Cleveland who had a food truck and needed to sell it. It was my EUREKA moment!

Perfect, a restaurant on wheels, and I can make my own hours! And with a name like "Vegan A Go-Go", it was much more fitting on wheels than a storefront!

Turns out he had purchased my truck from a couple in St. Louis and it was a VEGAN food truck to begin with!

I had my first season this year, and it has gone extremely well!

My message today is HOPE! Never give up and believe in yourself.

I didn't realize what a wonderful organization United Way is - they give exactly that, hope and encouragement to people, young and old. We are all truly blessed to know we have an organization like this right here in Canton and nationwide.

The first time she found herself homeless was when her mother passed away, and over the next couple of years, she was in and out of shelters. She had zero support system and was trying to do it all on her own.

She had earned minimum wage at her jobs but couldn't pay her bills and found herself back in shelter. She said, "The last time I went in, I did two runs – in for 90 days, out 10 days, and then, back in."

Finally, she was introduced to Alliance for Children and Families, one of the many partner agencies funded by United Way of Greater Stark County. They helped her get an apartment and the staff even took care of painting it and getting it ready for Kim. For the first time, Kim felt she was treated with respect and dignity.

"They listen, and if they can, they help in any kind of way. I now feel like I'm not going to be chronically homeless. They've shown me how to live my life – starting over. I had lost everything. I had nothing. When I came here, it seems like I just flipped a page. I have so much to be thankful for."

Kim now volunteers in the community, serving on the board of Alliance for Children and Families, helping others who are where she once was. She has goals for the future. Some day, she would like to be a case manager.
