Celebrating people in action

National Volunteer Week, April 10-16, has been recognized for more than 40 years. The celebration is about inspiring, recognizing and encouraging people to seek out imaginative ways to engage in their communities.

The Repository, with support from United Way of Greater Stark County, is recognizing outstanding volunteers in Stark County. In March, a community-wide call for nominations went out through the pages of The Repository and at CantonRep.com. Nominations were gathered and a selection committee comprised of editorial staff and community members selected the finalists and winners spotlighted in this special section.

Nominations were made in the following categories:

Volunteer of the Year

This award recognizes an individual who has made an impact on our community that goes far beyond typical volunteering. Over the past several years this person has excelled at making a positive impact that has changed the course of our region for the better. This individual has exhibited exceptional involvement which could include outstanding service at a particular event, leadership in an initiative or project, increased involvement in a volunteer role or sustained, long-term commitment to a particular volunteer role that is worthy of recognition.

Youth Volunteer Leadership Award

The Youth Volunteer Leadership Award recognizes an individual who demonstrates outstanding volunteer leadership in their school, community or group and is 15-21 years old.

Behind-the-Scenes Volunteer

This award will goes to a volunteer who assists with essential office or behind-the-scenes work. This individual is the glue of the organization or effort, giving others the ability to be on the front lines without worry of completing routine tasks that are necessary for success.

The Impact Award

This is open to any project, event or individual who has made a significant difference to the community in a relatively short amount of time. This nomination should tell a story about the difference or life changing impact the nominee has made to a person, community, or group in the past year.

Collaboration of the Year

This award goes to any project, event or activity that has been organized by two or more coming together to make an impact. The nomination should demonstrate examples of effective teamwork, how each group contributed to the activity and show how the project and community benefited from collaboration.

Outside the Box Award

This award recognizes a volunteer project, event or activity that has demonstrated 'outside the box' thinking, shown innovation and creativity, that has impacted our area in a big way.



Students provided us with the college/university of their choice and YLS members went to work. We collected hoodies from not only Stark County, but all over Ohio and even had donations com-



ing from Pennsylvania, Colorado and Washington! In the end, we provided 200 students with a hoodie from the school of their choice, a packet of college admissions information and a letter from an alumnus offering words of advice.



Elena's character has always impressed me and I have witnessed first-hand how it shines when she is helping others.



Volunteers then search opportunities by topic or agency and are provided with an array of services they could fill, and there are currently 1566 active volunteers in the resource. Registered volunteers can also sign up for special alerts when new volunteer opportunities become available.

"Volunteers help advance the community in every area of life. Their willingness to serve in any capacity moves Stark County to be stronger, healthier and more vibrant," said Elizabeth Ramsburg director of the United Way Volunteer Resource Center. "Through diverse opportunities, we can strengthen our community in the Education, Income and Health impact



areas.

There's a volunteer opportunity for everyone available through the Volunteer Resource Center. You can find opportunities ranging from after school programs to model train education and sewing blankets to driving dialysis patients. Regardless of your physical abilities or time availability, there are plenty of volunteer opportunities for every member of the community through United Way's partnership with 116 agencies.

One upcoming event requiring volunteers is the Pro Football Hall of Fame Race Weekend, April 22-24. People of all age groups are needed for this one-time volunteer opportunity. Behind the Scenes Award

As Volunteer Coordinator of Massillon Public Library, my heart is to make the nomination of M.L. Weaver, a true "Behind-the-Scenes Volunteer", an outstanding tribute to him and to his 25 years of service at Massillon Public Library. M.L. is a book mender, a uniquely gifted teacher, and a mentor to young adults and retirees.

He has more volunteer hours than any other volunteer ever at the Library and will be recognized at this year's Volunteer Recognition Night on May 19th with 3312 hours of volunteer time. If you have been fortunate enough to know M.L., you already agree with me that he is worthy of more special recognition than we could possibly give him.

I often see M.L. as a kind of skilled surgeon. He feels every book and magazine is worth careful examination, and his hope is to save each one for more shelf life for readers. Whether it is a child's picture book, a young adult novel, a valuable reference book from years ago, or a Bible someone asked him to preserve, he treats that book as his own treasure. Even very difficult cases aren't impossible for this amazing man to repair. M.L. is not only a book mender, but a teacher. Imparting his skills to others is one of his greatest assets to the Library. He delights in sharing what he knows with those who also see books as tools for learning, as avenues for traveling the world, and even as safe places to hide for awhile from the stresses of life.

Currently M.L. is training a fellow MAPS Museum volunteer to become his replacement. At age 90, he is ready to sleep in on some Tuesday mornings, rather than be at the Library before 8:00am. Faithfulness is another attribute that describes this man. If it is Tuesday, he will be at his mending table diligently at work. In so many ways, he is a role model for all of us.

Finally, I characterized M.L. as a mentor. A mentor is a wise and loyal advisor or coach. One particular example stands out. A young man in his early 20's talked with me about becoming a volunteer; however, he made it very plain that he did not want a job dealing with the public. He was quiet and shy and found it difficult to make eye contact. He slowly explained that he had gone through some extremely difficult family situations and felt he needed a place to work and heal. His grandmother suggested the Massillon Library.

Immediately I knew he needed to be under the love and instruction of M.L. It was the perfect fit. For the next 2 years, this young man was at the Library every Tuesday morning. He became quite skilled in mending even the most challenging materials. But he had no confidence that he could handle the job without M.L. beside him.

In the true wisdom of a mentor, M.L. devised a way to correct the problem. He began to leave early with a stack of books still to be repaired. His student now had to complete the task alone with M.L. not checking his work until the next week. His student became confident and developed an entirely new self image. Soon he decided he was ready to get a real job to begin to live a productive life and has been very successful. Last week he was in our computer center and let me know that not only has he applied for a responsible marketing position with a large food company, but also is planning to begin college at Malone University. Because M. L. was a mentor and friend, this young man is forever changed.

M.L is a kind and humble man. He has



never sought praise or recognition, but simply uses the gifts God has given him to bless and mold the lives of others. M.L. knows the value of reading and what books can do for people from children to working moms, from business professionals to presidents. His talent of mending books helps to leave a legacy of knowledge for all people willing to read.

M.L. is a true listener. He takes the time to hear what people are saying and then gives them encouragement. We will sincerely miss the love and commitment he has brought to Massillon Public Library when he retires. As Volunteer Coordinator, I will personally feel the loss on Tuesday mornings of this great man.

JJ Rhoades is one of Pathway Caring for Children's faithful and humble volunteers who has become a favorite attendant among Pathway's Independent Living Group for teens. When asked why he chose to volunteer with Pathway he says, "I can't say there is one specific reason why I want to volunteer, but I can say the kids today are the future of our tomorrow and should be an important part of all our lives. It doesn't matter where they come from, what their background is, or what their beliefs are, they need guidance and need to be taught. One of the simplest and best ways to learn is to be taught by someone who has made

those mistakes, learned from their past, and can share how to avoid those mistakes. By volunteering I hope they can learn something from me, I know I can definitely learn something from them."

JJ connects with the teens served by Pathway. The teens in our program are naturally drawn to JJ because he is personable and follows through with what he says he is going to do. These qualities build trust, which our teens are hesitant to give freely. JJ is fun and outgoing and his playful personality encourages even the most shy teens to participate in group activities.

JJ initially came to teach foster teens

about car maintenance and repairs but he has since come to every Pathway Independent Living Group and continues to make an impact on our teens. He says, "Perhaps the most enjoyable experience is watching the kids' attitudes go from "I don't care about any of this" to becoming eager to participate and learn more about a situation or project. I really am just glad to help and hope the kids get something out of my being there."

JJ works full-time and has a family of his own. However, he makes time to volunteer to invest in the lives of teenagers in foster care. *****

Volunteering Benefits for Health and Business

Volunteers create a stronger community through their dedicated service. By partnering with local agencies in need of resources, volunteers bridge the gap between innovative ideas and implementation. Their service leads to positive change in Stark County.

Volunteering does not just help the community, however. It also provides physical and mental health benefits for the participants. A 2013 study by United Health Group found 94 percent of volunteers said their mood is improved after volunteering, and 76 percent of the volunteers said they actually feel physically healthier after volunteering.

Some fear sacrificing time to volunteer will add stress to their already full workload, but with 78 percent of volunteers enjoying less stress through volunteering that myth is busted. Even more, Carnegie Mellon University released a 2013 report reviewed by Harvard that found adults who volunteer have significantly lower blood pressure and reduce their risk of mortality by 47 percent. Clearly, volunteering comes with some incredible health benefits!

Service is not just an individual act, though. Groups of volunteers can come together to accomplish larger projects and advance the community. One of the best ways to engage large groups of volunteers is through corporate social responsibility initiatives. Corporate volunteerism is a great investment in both employees and the community.

In the same United Health Group study, employers said workers who volunteered had better time management skills, stronger relationships with colleagues, enhanced people and teamwork skills and increased professional job skills. Of the employees engaged in social responsibility, 81 percent said they felt more connected to their workplace as a result.
